

FROM YOUR PASTOR

Thinking ahead (as is my want) and seeing it's his feast day next week, I was reminded of seeing the "Thomas Becket' exhibition at the British Museum a few years ago. It's 850 years since a band of knights, taking King Henry II at his word, decided to rid the realm of the troublesome priest, and Becket, according to the curators of the exhibition, "is a still a divisive figure to this day". Normally, I'd be tempted to say "What utter rubbish!" to such an assertion, but in the interests of fairness it isn't rubbish *if* your intention is to perpetuate Tudor propaganda which contends that "Henry VIII & English Reformation = GOOD; Catholicism, Papal Authority and Anything Before 1534 = BAD, VERY BAD". If that *is* your intention, figures like Beckett are a big problem.

Tudor Propaganda is alive and well today, make no mistake; indeed, we can find many a 'useful idiot' within our own Church helping it along with moronic statements that are notable for their vacuity and what they don't say. In the 1990s, with his book *The Stripping of the Altars*, Professor Eamonn Duffy become one of the first post-Reformation history scholars to seriously question the pretence that England was 'ripe' for Reformation. Europe may have been ripe, but England simply wasn't, Duffy suggests; on the contrary, the Faith was alive, well and flourishing. Recently, there's been a strong attempt to discredit Prof. Duffy and put him back in his box because he won't toe the Tudor propogandist's lie. By the way, he is a Catholic. Go figure.

Certainly, Thomas Becket was no 'saint' in the classical sense. But when someone stands up for the rights of the Church (and therefore, the rights of individuals, particularly poor individuals) then their sins pale into thin air as the glory of the Spirit-filled life shines over everything, sins included. The courage of such people terrifies authority so much so that the voice of Truth must be silenced, sometimes violently, sometimes by the sneakiness of so-called 'cancel culture'. St Alban, St Thomas Becket, St Margaret Clitheroe, Ss John Fisher & Thomas More, **ALL** the holy martyrs refused to settle for a bland, anaemic, pointless version of the Faith. It strikes me that Christmas is becoming just that for many in our society. Many will wonder "Is it all worth it?" as the next few days unfold, but they must find in us a people who are effusive in our traditions, unrestrained in our celebrating, excessive in our charity. I used to think it anomalous that we celebrated the Feast of a Martyr during Christmas week (indeed, loads of martyrs: St Stephen, Holy Innocents) but now I realise that they stand against the saccharine reduction of the Feast of the Incarnation and teach us to fight for so much more than tinsel, mince pies and great stuffed birds! Let us use these glorious celebrations to orient ourselves and others to the excessive, voluptuous glory of God's revelation to the whole human race.

On a personal note, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you who have given me such a kindly welcome during these last four months and have patiently put up with my slackness! Thank you to all who have worked/are working so hard to help our celebrations go well. May God bless us all with abundant graces over the next few days. A very happy and holy Christmas to you and all whom you love and here's hoping that 2024 will be kind to us all.
